Rates are based on a 32-gallon container or bundle not exceeding 50 pounds. Loose loads will be interpreted to accommodate the “per can” fees. Rate includes 3.6% Washington Refuse Tax.

Construction, Demo, Metal, Yard Waste & Large Items

Very limited quantities of construction, demo, metal, and yard waste are accepted at this site. We cannot accept items greater than 4 feet in length. Attendants will refer these types of material to the Coupeville Solid Waste Complex or suggest other disposal options.

Household Hazardous Waste

Household hazardous waste is accepted free of charge. Includes: antifreeze, gasoline, oil-based paints, fertilizers, pesticides, acids, bases, fluorescent bulbs, lead, PBC ballasts, propane tanks, mercury devices, etc. Notify the site attendant if you have hazardous waste.

Secure Your Load For Safer Roads.... It's The Law!

Examples of Secured Loads



Netting, straps, rope, and bungee cord can be used to tie each large item to the vehicle. Since there is nothing in the load that can blow out, a cover is not needed.



Garbage cans are secured to the truck with a strap. Lids are secured with bungee cords.



Tarp covers the entire load and is secured with cargo netting.

Examples of Inadequately Secured Loads



Tie downs are missing. Debris can fall or fly out of moving vehicle. Load should be covered with tarp and cargo net.



Tie downs are inadequate. Top, sides and back of load is not secure. Vehicle is overloaded. Load should be secured with straps and/or cargo net.



Debris can fall or fly out. Load should be secured to the trailer with rope, netting and/or straps.

What is an unsecured load?

An unsecured load is anything in transit that has not been fastened or attached to the vehicle. Tarps, rope, straps, netting, chains, and/or cargo bars may be used to prevent any part of the load or the covering from becoming loose, detached, or leaving the vehicle while it is moving.

How to secure your load

Tie down. Use rope, bungee cords, netting or straps. Tie larger items directly to your vehicle.

Lighter goes lower. Put lighter items at the bottom of the load, and weigh them down so they don't blow out.

Don't overload. Keep material level with truck bed or trailer if at all possible.

Double-check. Always double-check your load. Ask yourself, "Would I feel safe driving behind my vehicle? If the answer is, "No," then you need to do a better job of securing your load.

Facts

- Securing your load helps prevent roadside litter.
- In 2019, the Washington State Patrol investigated 154 collisions caused by unsecured vehicle loads and contacted 7,386 motorists for failing to secure their vehicles' load.
- If law enforcement observes your vehicle with an unsecured load, you can receive a citation with fines up to \$228. If your load falls out of your vehicle and injures someone you face fines up to \$5,000 plus jail time. (source WSP)
